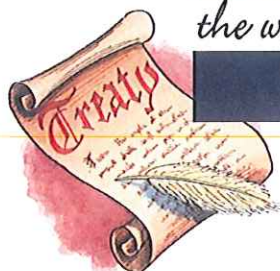

September is Prostate Cancer



& Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month

Cancers of the prostate gland, part of the male reproductive system. Prostate cancer is usually slow-growing, leading to controversy over the recommended screening. You should talk with your doctor about an individual screening program that is appropriate to you.

Those diagnosed with prostate cancer are given a 'grade' by their pathologist. Prostate cancer is graded based on the Gleason Scale, ranging from two to ten (because the scores are based on two samples, graded 1-5 and added together). Those with higher Gleason grades tend to be more aggressive. Your pathologist will also alert you if you have any Gleason 5s present in either sample, which can indicate a higher likelihood of recurrence.

Ovarian Cancer is one of the most deadly of women's cancers. Each year, approximately 21,980 women will be diagnosed with ovarian cancer. In 2014, approximately 14,270 women will die in the United States from this disease. It is estimated by the World Health Organization IARC department that there are over 238,000 new cases diagnosed annually and nearly 152,000 deaths worldwide.

I will attend self help meetings with them and assist them with obtaining a sponsor. I will support these individuals navigating and engaging in other CTSI programs 477, Voc Rehab, Education, Medical and Cultural. Through our CTSI programs I am open to referrals for outreach and willing to provide support to events in the Salem Area Office. I will walk with them through legal and DHS/I.H.S supporting addiction recovery through stressful times. By Fall I seek to have an every other week recovery based talking circle at the Salem Area Office and support both A&D and M/H providers to have weekly group sessions. Also a small but very important part of my work will be outreach to our Siletz community both offering services and encouraging individuals who may be hesitant to engage in recovery. Assisting individuals to obtain the help they need be it Detox or residential care, community support and encouraging these individuals to utilize all the services our tribe offers.

2017 Elk Tag Drawing Info

The annual drawing for the Tribe's elk rifle tags will be held on Monday, October 2nd at 5:00 pm in the Tribal Council chambers. Applications will be available starting on September 5th and are due September 22nd in the Natural Resources office. Applications can be picked up at the Natural Resources office, downloaded from the Tribe's website (Tribal Services/Other Departments/Natural Resources), or they can be mailed to you by calling the Natural Resources office. Each person must fill out, sign and turn in their own application. This year we have 25 tags each for the first and second season bull hunts and only 9 tags for the various cow hunts. Cut Wood For The Elders Day

The Tribal Natural Resources Committee and Natural Resources Department will sponsor the last "Cut Wood For The Elders Day" of the year on **Saturday, September 16th**. The woodcut will be held on the Tribe's Logsdon Road Property between the Tribal Food Distribution Warehouse and the Tribal Vehicle Storage Yard in Siletz. We need lots of volunteers to help cut, split and deliver firewood for Tribal elders. Bring your chainsaws, hydraulic wood splitters, splitting mauls, axes, and lots of energy. Even if you don't have any of those we can use the moral support! Lunch, drinks, and snacks will be provided. We will start at 8:00 AM and go until mid-afternoon.

The goal of this event will be to deliver firewood to as many elders as possible. The Elders' Program maintains a list of elders that burn wood for their winter heat. People willing to haul firewood to elders outside of the Siletz area, please contact the Elders Program Clerk at 1-800-922-1399 ext. 1261 or 541-444-8261 to be paired up with an elder in need. We especially need folks who can haul wood to the Eugene, Salem, and Portland areas. Elders in need of firewood should also contact the Elders Program Clerk to get their name on the delivery list.

If you have parents or grandparents that burn wood in the winter to stay warm, you need to help out at this event! Come help replenish those wood piles for the coming winter. **This is the last woodcut of the year!**

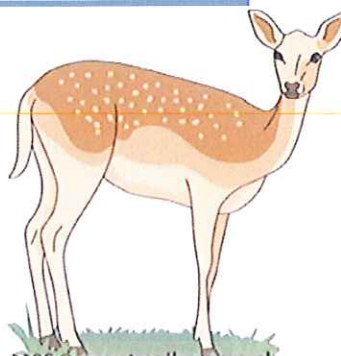

BROCCOLI CAULIFLOWER SALAD

HIGHER EDUCATION/ADULT VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM

The deadline to apply for 2017/2018 year was June 30, 2017. The next deadline to apply is June 30, 2018. It is a requirement that you complete your FAFSA by January 31, 2018 to be eligible to receive tribal assistance.

ADULT EDUCATION

The Adult Education program is for Siletz Tribal members, 16 years or older, who are not already enrolled in a formal education program. The Adult Education program can assist with the following: Obtaining GED, certificates, or otherwise raise levels of educational achievement through adult classes to improve employment status through education/training. There is no deadline to apply for classes. For an application, please call **SONYA** at (503) 390-9494.

Siletz Tribal Youth Activity Fund

Helps to fund programs for Siletz tribal youth in the many areas such as: sports, music, camp fees, lab fees, shop supplies, graduation, educational /scholastic materials, cultural supplies and materials, correspondence courses, and extra-curricular supplies. Siletz Tribal members from kindergarten to high school can access up to \$75.00.

Siletz Tribal Head Start Program

Is a preschool program for children 3 to 4 years old. The Salem Center has AM and PM classes. It operates Monday through Thursday for 3.5 hours a day. Transportation depends on residency, which will be determined after acceptance. Register in Spring for the following school year. All Siletz Tribal applications and forms are posted on the Tribal website at: www.ctsi.nsn.us.

IMPORTANT CHANGES IN HEAD START: There are new regulations that require to conduct either a face-to-face or telephone interview with everyone who applies and we cannot finish processing any application unless the interview is done.

Denial and Recovery

Most of us use denial to protect ourselves from the awareness that we are addicted. In its simplest form, denial is a lack of information. We experience symptoms we don't understand, so we push them out of our thoughts. Denial can become a conscious suppression. We know we are experiencing something painful, but we consciously push it from our mind because of shame, guilt or unwillingness to look at what's causing the pain. There are 3 levels of denial, they are;

- Mild denial-lacking the information needed to understand what is happening.
- Moderate denial-consciously pushing unwanted memories or thoughts from the mind.
- Severe denial-unconsciously repressing the memories or thoughts. Adverse symptoms are present when the person has no idea of what is causing the symptoms.

Denial can save us from feeling anything temporarily but it can also keep us going in our addiction and become a runaway train of the very emotions that we are trying not to feel. Some tips to support recovery from denial are:

- Honestly examine what you fear.
- Think about the potential negative consequences of not taking action.
- Allow yourself to express your fears and emotions.
- Try to identify irrational beliefs about your situation.
- Journal about your experience.
- Open up to a trusted friend or loved one or professional.
- Ask for help

Recovery is an ongoing process, and overcoming denial is just one of many steps towards restoration.

New Opportunities in Mental Health Coming Soon

Earlier in the year, Mental Health Specialist Rachel had the opportunity to go to Levels 1 and 2 Gottman couples counseling training. She is ready to start putting these skills to use, both in Siletz and the Portland and Salem area offices.

What is Gottman Couples Counseling?

- 1) This is an evidence-based practice that helps couples work on their relationships. It starts with an extensive survey that provides detailed information to the therapist and is used to create the ultimate and unique treatment plan for the couple.
- 2) In Gottman couples counseling, the couple learns many tools that will help them communicate better, understand their partner's needs more fully, and work together to create a more satisfying relationship for both individuals.
- 3) Another component of Gottman couples counseling is Emotion Coaching, which is a program designed to help parents better understand and relate to the emotions their children are experiencing and often having trouble expressing.

Potential Ways Mental Health Specialist Rachel Could Help Tribal Members And Their Families With These New Skills

- 1) Rachel comes to Siletz at least once a month, and she'd like to start offering couples sessions during that time. These would be hour-long sessions with the end goal of leaving the couple with tools to practice until the next session.
- 2) Rachel is formulating a way to do a Gottman Couples retreat, which would be a full weekend in which couples could come do a tune-up in their relationships.
- 3) Rachel is thinking about ways to adapt the Gottman training to include Native healing practices and adventure-based therapy such as ropes courses and hiking.

Traditional Coping

Though Gottman's methods are tried and true, they are not the only thing important in living a healthy Native life. The Siletz peoples are encouraged to keep in harmony with their ancestors' ways. September is a time to start preparing for the winter; gathering fall foods, attending sweats, and smudging continue to be of importance in our daily lives.

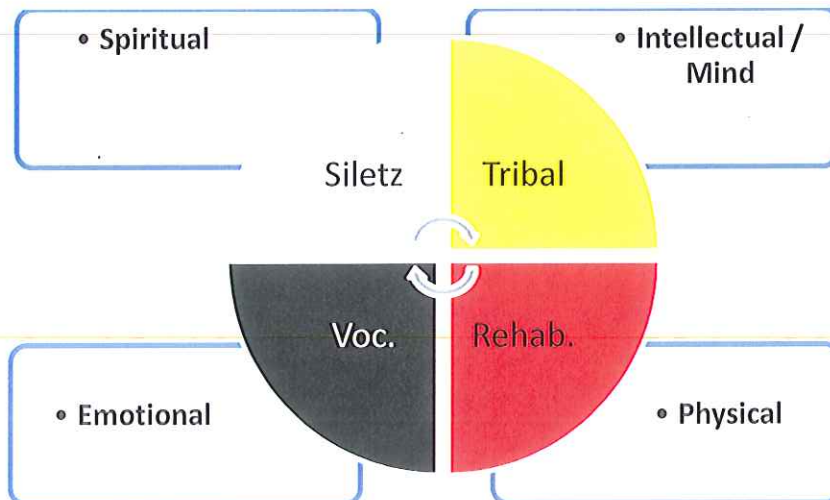

STVRP Consumer Stories

Mickey's Story

His Background...

Mickey was a middle-aged man with a high school diploma who came in for tribal services with severe anxiety, depression, ADHD, and a history of alcohol abuse (in remission). He had been out of work for several years, had no income or permanent residence, and his motivation to become employed was at an all-time low. He had been working with OVRS with limited success and wanted to explore tribal services.

His Success...

Through guidance and counseling services, he remained in tribal mental health counseling. STVRP reviewed his IPE goals and helped him stay on track. He was able to fill out applications on his own and participated in interviewing for prospective jobs. He was focused and insistent on finding gainful employment. Mickey was hired on at a local Fred Meyer store and has been successfully employed there.

Minnie's Story

Her Background...

Minnie presented with severe anxiety, depression, and battered victim syndrome. She was removed from the primary school so that she could be a full time caretaker to her younger siblings. Due to these circumstances, she was unable to further her education. She came to tribal services requesting assistance with obtaining gainful employment. Although, she was working part-time, she was encouraged by the business owner to find a job as the owners were going to close their business.

Minnie had been in extensive tribal county mental health counseling and was on psychotropic medications. She was highly motivated to find employment that did not require a high school diploma or GED. STVRP referred her to the local community college for basic education courses and to possibly be evaluated for a learning disability so as to be accommodated in her goal to obtain her GED.

Her Success...

Minnie showed her resiliency as a "can do" client and impressed with her history of maintaining long term employment using a plethora of soft skills that could be easily transferred to her next job. Her employer and STVRP assisted her in applying on-line for customer service positions and other jobs. She was hired on part-time at a Sheriff's department where she has maintained employment for several months. With STVRP's assistance, she was also hired on at Spirit Mountain Casino. Minnie is currently working full time and loves her job

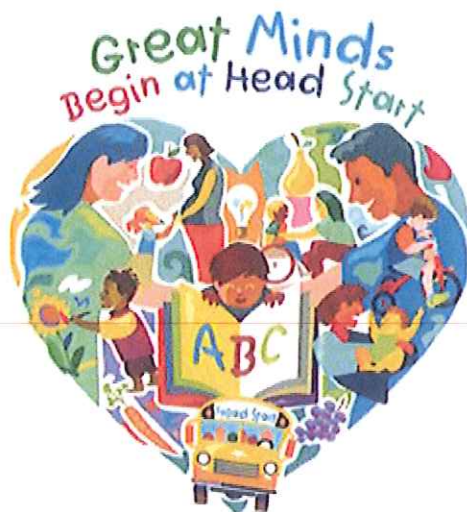

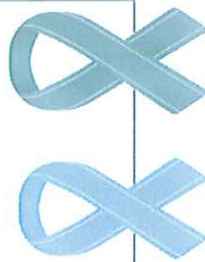
