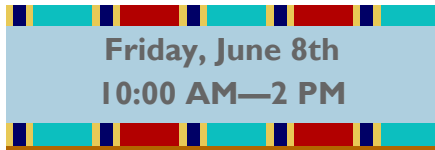

Time to calm crying baby

- Cuddling
- Skin to skin on chest
- Talking
- Stroking

Babies communicate through their cries, coos, facial expressions, and body language long before they say their first words. Responding to your baby by making eye contact, talking and meeting their needs, shows that you are there and they can trust you. Look in your baby's eyes and talk to them throughout the day as you feed, change and play. The pictures on the left, show you cues your baby gives that he or she is hungry. Learning to respond to your baby's cues is a big step in bonding and attachment.

Fathers Day is June 19th



Have a happy and healthy day! Father's are very important to us all so make sure you take good care of yourself! Men's health week is June 13 – 19, and is intended to heighten the awareness of preventable health problems and encourage early detection and treatment of disease among men and boys.

One of the most important indicators of health is your blood pressure. Less than 120/80 is best. 140/90 or more is high blood pressure. Tribal members who participated in a tribal health assessment done in June 2003 indicated that 42% had high blood pressure and 34% had high cholesterol. Everyone needs to know his or her blood pressure and cholesterol levels and follow the doctor's advice.

Did you know that the lack of physical activity and not eating the right foods, taken together, are the second greatest underlying cause of death in the United States? (Smoking is the number one cause.)

When you start your exercise program remember you don't have to be active for 30 minutes all at once. Ten minutes of endurance activity at a time is fine. Endurance activity makes you breath harder and will increase your energy. Just make sure those 10 minute sessions add up to a total of 30 minutes a day. Walking to the store, around your neighborhood, or on your break and/or lunch are good opportunities to get 30 minutes a day of exercise.

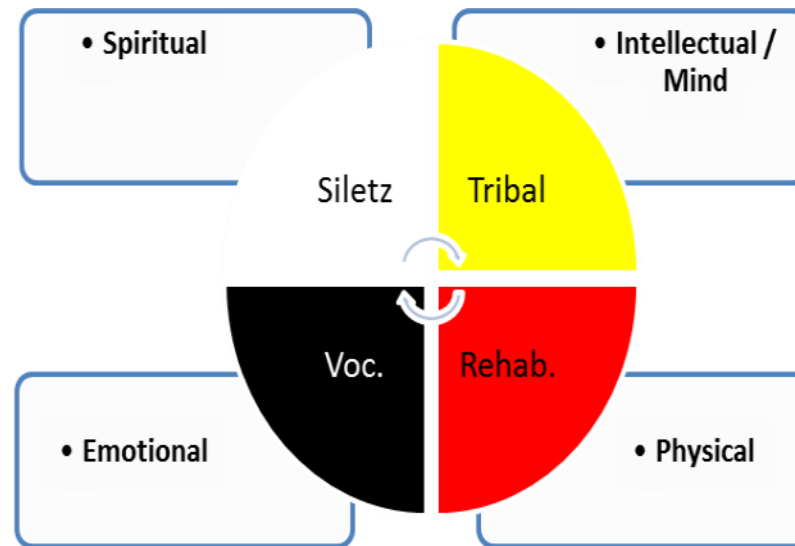

From the archives: Summer fun & Summer challenges

Summer is a time when the sun is out, and feelings can be at their highest, happiest point. For children and adults still in school, summer can also be a time of turmoil, brought on by the lack of a daily schedule. It may be a time that parents ease their kids off medications that are necessary during the school year.

Here are some things to keep in mind to help summer be enjoyable for all, and a time of mental health:

1. Exercise: go out and do a fun physical activity; 30 minutes every day can do so much for our souls. The summer is a great time to get outdoors and go do hikes, go to the pools that are opening back up.
2. Try and create a routine, and stick to it more days than not. Of course, things will come up, just get back to that routine when you can.
3. Sit your children down (or yourself) and discuss goals and expectations for the summer months. Everyone breathes a bit more easy when it's known what should be happening.
4. Take some time each day to give yourself and your family a feelings check-in; this way you can catch depression and anxiety before they get out of hand.

5. Meditation, relaxation—take time each day to sit and reflect, and unwind from the day's stresses. Don't forget, if you aren't caring for yourself, it will be harder to care for others.

Traditional Coping

Traditionally, summer is the time of salmon fishing, clam gathering, and berry picking. There are many plants important to the tribe that get picked during the summer. If you're unfamiliar with such activities, reach out to an elder, for they truly have a wealth of knowledge. As always, smudging, sweats, and talking circles are ways to reach to our Native traditions.

Summer Youth Employment Program

The 477-Self Sufficiency Program (SSP) is accepting applications for our Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP). This Program is separate from the Tribal Employment Program offered through the Education Department.

The Program mission is to provide youth ages 14-24 with the opportunity to gain employment or education skills in a field that interests them. Our current placements are 240 hours and pay is \$9.25/hour for Work Experience and \$7.00/hour for Classroom Training stipends. The Program is available to youth that reside within the 11-county service area.

Basic eligibility criteria includes but is not limited to:

- Youth must be between 14-24 at the time of application

- Native American verification (includes Native American, Native Alaskan and Native Hawaiian) and those enrolled in a federally recognized Indian Tribe. Participants can also be eligible with verification of descendency from a family member who is enrolled with a federally recognized tribe.

- Latest school grade report. Participants will need to have at least a minimum Grade Point Average (G.P.A.) of 2.0. Participants below a 2.0 can participate in a classroom training program and receive a stipend while they attend summer school. Income eligibility require-

ments apply.

Slots are limited and are on a first come, first serve basis. If you are interested in applying for the Summer Youth Employment Program, please contact one of our Tribal Services Specialists or Intake Specialists located in each of the Tribal offices.

mated recording of the amount as well as going to the Tribal website, under the opening page of the member area login for the written announcement.

Where Is My Per Capita Check?

Per Capita checks are going to be mailed on Monday, July 31st to the current address on file with the Enrollment Department.

The Tribal Member Distribution Ordinance requires distribution of checks to be initially MAILED; therefore it CAN NOT be picked up at the Siletz Tribal Office. Per capita checks are NOT able to be direct deposited.

Mail from Siletz takes as long as four days to get to an address in Portland, Salem and Eugene. Please allow for the “snail mail” time before calling to see where your per capita check is.

If you are a “Missing Moccasin” as of Friday, July 13th your check will be held until a correct address is submitted. If you are a “Missing Moccasin” and update your address between Monday, July 16th and Tuesday, July 31st the per capita check will be MAILED ON Tuesday, August 1, 2018. All other “Missing Moccasins” that update their address after August 1, 2018 will have their checks mailed when the address update is received.

The adult “Missing Moccasin” list is now on the Tribal website on the Enrollment page under Government Listing. Please check there to see if you know anyone that is listed.

Policy states you must wait 15 business days (in the case of per capita checks until 8/22/2018) from the time of mailing before you can submit a request for a “stop payment” and have the check re-issued. This allows time for the check to be returned if it is “undeliverable” to the address it was mailed to.

If your check is returned as “undeliverable” you must submit an address update in order to have your check re-mailed.

Missing Moccasins Do Not Receive Their Per Capita Checks On Time!

If someone does not have a good address and phone number on file with Enrollment, that person is considered a “Missing Moccasin.”

Please check the list on the Tribal web-site for anyone you might know. Missing Moccasins do not receive this newsletter, election mail, per capita checks, 1099 forms and other important mail from the Tribe. Are you a parent of a minor Tribal member that did not receive a statement of their Minor Trust account earlier this year? It could be that your CHILD is a missing moccasin.

Address Changes

If you have recently moved, even if you have a forwarding address on file with the post office, please get your *Address & Contact Information Update* form in as soon as possible. You can get the form on the Tribal website, from any Tribal office or contact the Enrollment Department to have one mailed to you. All address updates must be in writing to ensure that you have requested the address to be changed, this is for your own security.

As a note, “General Delivery” is NOT an acceptable as a mailing address as it is only temporary and the Post Office will only hold the mail for a limited time for delivery. We had a large amount of “General Delivery” mail returned and this is not effective in getting mail to tribal members when we need to. It is much better to rent a Post Office box if you are not able to use a permanent address somewhere else. If this is a concern for you or someone on the Missing Moccasin list, call 1.800.922.1399 ext. 1258 and we will work with them to figure out a permanent address solution.
